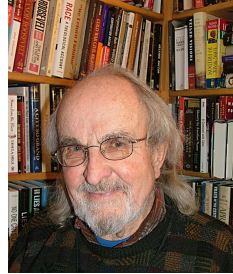


**21ST ANNUAL SALEM AWARD**

**Thomas Doyle**, an ordained priest, was instrumental in exposing sex abuse within the Catholic Church. In the 1980s, he was a fast-rising church insider at the Vatican Embassy in Washington, D.C. when he discovered how church leadership covered up the sexual abuse of children by priests. He came forward with little regard for his own position as a priest but with great concern for the victims of this abuse.

In 1968, **Horace Seldon** had an epiphany about racism following Dr. King's assassination. A white man and a United Church of Christ Minister, he experienced a clear calling that his life's work was to dismantle structural racism and address what the Kerner Commission called the "white problem." That year, he founded Community Change Inc. (CCI) of Boston, a non-profit group that addresses racial issues through a variety of community activities. [Learn more.](#)
